Upon my request, past District 36 Governor (1985-1986) D. Anne Martin, DTM, recently provided information about this historical role. She later served the organization as an International Director in 1988-1990.

Our club members can be proud of our past leaders who identified a problem and determined solutions, which were later adapted by Toastmasters International Board of Directors for the benefit of all Toastmasters past, present and future.

I love interacting with each of you during the TLI events. We have great opportunities this winter with the TLI Team's efforts to **network** (open to **all club members** -- see pages 2 and 14 for more information), **learn**, and **share**. District 36 History of TLI

[Prior to the mid-1980s] Toastmasters International provided a training manual entitled Club Officer Training. It was one comprehensive manual covering all offices. The Area Governor [the position now named as Area Director] was responsible for training club officers. Typically, a meeting room was scheduled and the officers from all clubs would assemble for "training". If you missed this session, any make-up or additional training was at the discretion of the Area Governor.

During my years as a club, area, and district staff officer I witnessed this process as somewhat "hit or miss" and determined that there was a more "tailored" aspect to training and that this "general" approach did not lend itself to a specific office or the opportunities for leadership inherent in each office. The quality of training for all club officers in any particular area was dependent on the interest and capabilities of the Area Governor.

What Is Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI)

It's the Toastmasters Leadership Institute, where Toastmasters from across the district come together to network, share ideas, and be inspired. It's where newly-elected club officers receive training on how to best serve their clubs.

Why TLI Each club needs a minimum of four (4) officers to be trained during each training period (June – August and December – February) to complete Goal 9 – Training of the Distinguished Club Program (DCP). The more officers trained the more successful your club will be in meeting the needs of its members.

Please note that only officers of record may earn the club's DCP credit for their role. Earning credit is accomplished by attending a training session for their officer role and signing in on the sign-in sheet provided for that session.


November 30, 2021 DD LSDES Topic: Conflict is Inevitable, Combat is Optional

We recently asked two frequent TLI instructors the following questions regarding TLI and club officer training.

Scott Meyer, DTM, past District 36 Director. responses.

- 1. Your Name: Scott Meyer
- 2. Your Education Level at Toastmasters International: DTM
- 3. Which TLI Club Officer Training have you taught? *President, VPE, VPM, VPPR, Secretary, Treasurer, or Sergeant at Arms*: I've taught everything but VPPR. Most often I teach Treasurer, VPM or President.
- 4. What did you enjoy about teaching at a TLI? Sharing my experiences, meeting other Toastmasters and learning from the shared experiences.
- 5. What do you bring to the session with your experience? You actually answered your own question. I try to help attendees think forward and not simply react as issues arise. I do a couple things in my trainings.
- I encourage them to look around at the others in the class; these are great resources for you. Any issue you are experiencing is or has almost always been experienced by others, so look to your peers for help.

- The single most important duty of any officer is finding a replacement; assess your fellow club members and identify potential successors and start training them now.
- 6. What do you remember about attendees' reactions to the session? Most have some sort of "a-ha" moment when something clicks with them. To help ensure that everyone walks away with something new, I often ask them to share one issue that they/their club is experiencing so I can try to address this and offer suggestions on how to address the issue.
- 7. What are some most important concepts that you mention in every session? See #5; I think these are critical.

All Club Officers should be proud of their continued progress in Toastmasters.

Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI) training is an awesome opportunity to refresh Core Officer knowledge, strengthen your club, and receive your credit for your DCP goal. All members are welcome to attend the electives.

- 1. Your Name Janice Strachan
- 2. Your Education Level at Toastmasters International: DTM
- 3. Which TLI Club Officer Training have you taught? President, VPE, VPM, VPPR, Secretary, Treasurer, or Sergeant at Arms: In Summer 2021 TLI, I taught VPM and VPPR plus a couple of electives.
- 4. What did you enjoy about teaching at a TLI? I love when others in the class share their experiences and tips. They have such terrific ideas and I have learned many things from them during these discussions.
- 5. What do you bring to the session with your experience? Over the years, I have held every club officer role, and I have taken every club officer class more than once. I find that I am using the information that was shared with me by those excellent instructors to teach others. I have gathered examples of scripts for SAA, worksheets for grammarians and ah counters, social media tips, and evaluation methods. These resources help new officers build their own skills and those of their club members.

- 6. What do you remember about attendees' reactions to the session? Most participants in club officer training appreciate getting suggestions and examples of how to perform their role to the best of their ability. They love getting resources and ideas of the instructor and other participants. The evaluations I have received express gratitude for the value of the training they received.
- 7. What are some most important concepts that you mention in every session? I usually show them the Club Central site at www.toastmasters.org, where TI has made available many officer resources. I also show them where to find their club's DCP report. Then I share the value of having a FTH club website and how that can help with their officer role.

A Special Message to Corporate / Government Clubs

I recently heard from an Area Director that one of her club Presidents, from a corporate club, stated that they didn't see any need to go to officer training. "Their club's doing just fine, thank you very much, and they don't need to go to officer training." I was stunned by this club president's comment.

You might be wondering "what is a corporate club?"

The simplest answer is that corporate clubs are hosted by corporations or companies or non-profit foundations or government agencies (on any level such as county, state, or federal). The degree to which any entity provides support can range from allowing the group to use conference room space only, to providing refreshments for each meeting, to paying the membership dues, to tying promotions and professional development performance plans to active participation in Toastmasters meetings. Entities may allow the club to be open to non-employees or closed to only employees of the organization.

I contacted Past International President, Pat Johnson, DTM, who wrote "A Handbook for Building and Sustaining Vibrant Toastmaster Programs in Corporations" (available from the TI Store). She is a past Region Advisor for Region 10 (Europe) and is now serving as a Region Advisor for Region 2 (southern part of the U.S. West Coast). She also moderated a panel discussion during the 2021 Virtual International

Convention on "How Toastmasters Can Advance Your Career". If you did not watch this session from the convention, you missed so many great ideas about how to explain the benefits you receive by participation in the Toastmasters program in your corporation or government agency.

I wanted to hear what Pat would say to this club President. "If you're a leader, you go to training. I don't care how long you've been around; you're still learning." She paraphrased a quote seen on the desk of another International President, "When you're finished learning, you're done" -- 'done' as in you are dead.

My conversation with Pat contained many ideas that I want to share with our corporate and government clubs. This is why I am facilitating a networking session at the December 4th TLI (see page 2 and 14 for more information). Come and talk to me about what your club is facing. I want to help you or your club be better!

By not wanting to attend training, this club officer is cutting off themself and their club members from hearing new ideas from other attendees, about new programs being sponsored by the district, about updates from Toastmasters International or networking with other attendees. My feeling of sadness for this club remains.

Similar Yet Different: Trainer vs. Speaker

District 36 wants excellent trainers to lead TLI classes. Do you know the similarities and differences between a good speaker and a good trainer?

Here are some similarities for a trainer and a speaker:

- Both involve an audience
- Both involve speaking in front of a group
- Both require connection with the audience
- Both require communication skills and specific content area knowledge
- Both aim for certain results

Maybe you have some of these skills and can easily make the transition from being a good speaker to an excellent trainer. Let's take a look at some of the differences between a trainer versus a speaker. If you think you might to make that transition, you may want to attend a future "Speaker to Trainer" workshop.

Presenter	Speaker	Trainer
Content/Venue	Event/Conference	Class/ Workshop/Seminar
Topic	Can be broad, may be required to align to the event	Pre-arranged
Purpose	Inform / Persuade / Entertain; Convey Message	Change participants' behavior, Convey Message
Audience	May not know prior to the speech	Should be clear what the audience will receive
Style	One-way communication, mostly	Two-way communication
Method	Tells them what you are going to tell them, tells them, tells them what have told them	Determines what they know; Determines what they need to know. Fills in the gap; Using specific training guidance or materials
Tools & Techniques	Storytelling, body language and etc.	+ role-plays, exercises, case studies, demonstrations, visual aids, Q&A, and more
Talking and listening	Mostly talking, with some audience interactions	Talking and listening through class discussions and activities
Feedback/Evaluation	Applause / Audience engagement	Knowledge/value obtained by the trainees



District 36 History of Toastmasters Leadership Institute

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Each year, any number of area governors were in the very early stages of leadership development and would not have the experience to answer questions or fully develop the training.

I put together a committee and we began to brainstorm ideas for training. What came from these sessions was a training delivery system that we called Toastmasters University. We would develop classes that would cover the duties and responsibilities specific to that office. In addition, we would develop a selection of electives from which a student could choose for personal growth. The time sensitive burden of training all officers within an area would not be borne solely by the area governor. Our thinking was that e.g., the training for Club President would be some required core classes and an elective. The need to "change classes" would provide a sense of energy and also different people in the different classes which would enhance discussion and new ideas. In order the keep track of these multiple classes, former toastmaster Ed Fox and DTM Susan Ellsworth began to work on a system of data base management. At the conclusion of each 50-minute class, the student's registration card would be "marked" to be turned in at the end of the day to the data base mangers who would print out, as appropriate, a "diploma". The "status" of a diploma was also thought to be an incentive for attendance and something to take back to the club to perhaps

encourage more individuals to attend. By having specific criteria and subject matter for each office, a toastmaster whose first club office might be, e.g., Sgt at Arms, would be exposed to the specific duties and responsibilities (in addition to the synergy of new ideas) with each session of TMU as she/he took the classes for the offices leading to club president. She/he would also be exposed to officers from different clubs rather than only the officers in the club's Area, thus expanding the opportunities for ideas and creativity.

This idea came to fruition and was introduced to Toastmasters President Helen Blanchard (the first woman to be International President) when she made a visit to District 36 in May 1986. We armed President Blanchard with documentation, and she took the concept back to TI Headquarters. In 1993, the Board of Directors examined a working model of Toastmasters University and recommended that the name "Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI)" be used instead of "Toastmasters University." The Board further recommended that, after September 1, 1993, the terminology "university" and "college" cease to be used for Toastmasters training programs.

Thus, the concept of "TLI" began in District 36 (in the living room of Doris Anne Martin) by a team of motivated toastmasters that included Dick Fath, E.J. Burgay, Ed Fox, Susan Ellsworth, and Jay Aul.
